H. F. No. 61, A bill for an act relating to the collection of delinquent taxes on certain vacant and unoccupied lands by seizure and sale of grass, hay, dead or down timber, or sand and gravel thereon.

H. F. No. 62, A bill for an act to amend Mason's Minnesota Statutes of 1927, Section 4936, relating to the liability of employers to their employes for personal injuries or death.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

H. F. No. 63, A concurrent resolution memorializing Congress to fix a minimum price on farm products.

Whereas, The financial returns from the farming industry or occupation in the State of Minnesota have been such that the people engaged in this pursuit are practically bankrupt, demanding immediate drastic action, and

Whereas, The farmers are the largest buyers of commercial products in the nation and a return of their purchasing power is essential before we can have any general and lasting return of prosperity, and

Whereas, In view of the price-fixing opportunities given by national legislation to industry, and in view of the curtailment of farm production in the face of a consumption need that exceeds the production capacity of agriculture at its peak, except for wheat,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That we urge Congress to pass legislation directing the Secretary of Agriculture to fix minimum prices upon basic farm commodities as a prerequisite to any plan or program for production control of such basic farm commodities.
