

**BUREAU OF CRIMINAL APPREHENSION LIST OF FIREARMS INCLUDED  
WITHIN THE DEFINITION OF "SEMI-AUTOMATIC MILITARY-STYLE  
ASSAULT WEAPON"  
AUGUST 1, 2004**

Pursuant to Minnesota Statutes 624.712, Subdivision 8, the following is the BCA's current authoritative list of the firearms included within the definition of "semiautomatic military-style assault weapon".

**A firearm is considered to be a semiautomatic military-style assault weapon if it is:**

- 1) Any of the firearms, or copies or duplicates of the firearms, in any caliber, known as:
  - a) Norinco, Mitchell and Poly Technologies Avtomat Kalashnikovs (all models),
  - b) Beretta AR-70 (SC 70)
  - c) Colt AR-15
  - d) Fabrique Nationale FN-FAL, FN-LAR and FN-FNC,
  - e) Action Arms Israeli Military Industries UZI and Galil,
  - f) Intratec TEC-9, TEC-DC9
  - g) SWD M-10, M-11, M-11/9 and M-12,
  - h) Steyr AUG and
  - i) Revolving-cylinder shotguns such as or similar to Street Sweeper and Striker-12.
  
- 2) A semiautomatic rifle that has an ability to accept a detachable magazine and has at least two of the following:
  - a) Folding or telescoping stock,
  - b) Pistol grip that protrudes conspicuously beneath the action of the weapon,
  - c) Bayonet mount,
  - d) Flash suppressor or threaded barrel designed to accommodate a flash suppressor,
  - e) Grenade launcher.
  
- 3) A semiautomatic pistol that has an ability to accept a detachable magazine and has at least two of the following:
  - a) Ammunition magazine that attaches to the pistol side of the pistol grip,
  - b) Threaded barrel capable of accepting a barrel extension, flash suppressor, forward handgrip or silencer,
  - c) Shroud that is attached to or partially or completely encircles the barrel and permits the shooter to hold the firearm with the non-trigger hand without being burned,
  - d) Manufactured weight of 50 ounces or more when the pistol is unloaded,
  - e) Semiautomatic version of an automatic firearm.
  
- 4) A semiautomatic shotgun that has at least two of the following:
  - a) Folding or telescoping stock,
  - b) Pistol grip that protrudes conspicuously beneath the action of the weapon,
  - c) Fixed magazine capacity in excess of five rounds,
  - d) Ability to accept a detachable magazine.
