Proclamation

WHEREAS:

President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863,

during the Civil War; and

WHEREAS:

The Emancipation Proclamation forever freed all slaves in those parts of ten states still in

rebellion against the government of the United States, and ordered the military to

protect their freedom; and

WHEREAS:

The Emancipation Proclamation marked the beginning of the end of slavery in the

United States, and resulted in the immediate freeing of as many as 50,000 people from

slavery; and

WHEREAS:

The Emancipation Proclamation led to the freeing of 3.1 million of the 4 million people

then enslaved in the United States; and

WHEREAS:

As a war measure, the Emancipation Proclamation strengthened the position of the Union, decreased the likelihood of European support for the Confederacy, and invited African American men to join the Union war effort, resulting in the enlistment of

200,000 former slaves and free African Americans by the war's end; and

WHEREAS:

The Emancipation Proclamation transformed the Civil War into a war for freedom, adding moral force to the Union cause and recognizing the actions of African Americans

who fought for their own freedom and equality throughout the war; and

WHEREAS:

Slavery was made illegal in the United States by the Thirteenth Amendment to the

Constitution, ratified in December 1865; and

WHEREAS:

January 1, 2013, marks the 150th Anniversary of President Abraham Lincoln's issuance of

the Emancipation Proclamation.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, MARK DAYTON, Governor of Minnesota, do hereby proclaim January 1, 2013, as:

EMANCIPATION PROCLAMATION REMEMBRANCE DAY

in the State of Minnesota, and encourage Minnesotans to recognize the significance of this milestone in the history of freedom and civil rights.
